Delivery Format:

This course is delivered online using an Integrated Learning System (Blackboard Learn) and involves use of email, file attachments, podcasts, video instructions, and discussion forums.

SEMESTER 1 - FALL SEMESTER:

<u>Course Description:</u> This course covers composers, their works and historical events in music from @600 A.D. to present

SD Content Standards:

- Students will understand music's relationship to society, the other arts, disciplines outside the arts, history, and culture.
- Students will listen to, analyze and evaluate music.
- Students will use the performance of music as a means for creative expression and communication.

Course Objectives:

- Identify composers by musical era and compositions.
- Describe and describe characteristics of Middle Ages, Renaissance, Baroque, Romantic, Classical, Nationalism, and Contemporary musical eras.
- Correlate events in history of classical music with those in American history.

Course Schedule:

- Week One: Welcome to class, introduction of course content.
- Week Two: Pretest to determine musical background, begin Middle Ages.
- Week Three: Renaissance period, Baroque era composers Vivaldi, Handel, and Bach.
- Week Four: Quiz over Medieval and Renaissance periods.
- Week Five: Classical era composers Haydn and Mozart. Movie Amadeus.
- Week Six: Composers Beethoven, Schubert and Mendelssohn.
- Week Seven: Test one. Comparison of Renaissance, Baroque and Classical eras.
- Week Eight: Begin Romantic era composers Weber, Berlioz and Chopin.
- Week Nine: Composers Schumann, Brahms, Paganini, and Liszt.
- Week Ten: Composers Wagner, Strauss and Mahler.
- Week Eleven: Nationalism composers Smetana, Dvorak, Grieg, Sibelius.
- Week Twelve: Review of all information to date. Quarter test.
- Week Thirteen: Composers Glinka, Rimsky-Korsakov, Mussorgsky, Tchaikovsky, and Rachmaninoff.
- Week Fourteen: Nationalism test. Classical Music in this Century composers Debussy, Ravel, Stravinsky.
- Week Fifteen: Composers Prokofiev, Shostakovich, and Schoenberg.
- Week Sixteen: The Americans Copland, Gershwin, Barber, Bernstein and Ives.
- Week Seventeen: Comprehensive Listening exam.
- Week Eighteen: Comprehensive history exam.

SEMESTER 2 - SPRING SEMESTER:

<u>Course Description:</u> This course covers the instruments of the orchestra, basic music theory concepts, and basic composition.

SD Content Standards:

- Generate musical ideas for various purposes and contexts.
- Select and develop musical ideas for defined purposes and contexts.
- Share creative musical work that conveys intent, demonstrates craftsmanship, and exhibits originality.
- Develop personal interpretations that consider creators' intent.
- Evaluate and refine personal and ensemble performances, individually or in collaboration with others.
- Analyze how the structure and context of varied musical works inform the response.
- Relate musical ideas and works with varied context to deepen understanding.

Course Objectives:

- Students will understand how music influences and reflects culture.
- Students will compare how composers use different elements to convey emotions.
- Students will identify what different musical styles reveal about their respective time periods.
- Students will describe how stylistic elements of these periods differ from those we hear today.

Course Schedule:

- Week One: Welcome to class, pretest to determine musical background, piano, harpsichord and organ.
- Week Two: Quiz one: compare keyboard instruments. Strings violin, viola, cello, double bass, harp, guitar, playing techniques.
- Week Three: Woodwinds flute, piccolo, oboe, English horn, clarinet, saxophone, bassoon, voice. Quiz two: woodwind and string instruments.
- Week Four: Top brass French horn, trumpet. Low brass trombone, tuba, baritone. Quiz three: brass instruments.
- Week Five: Percussion timpani, bass, snare, cymbals, xylophone, triangle, tambourine, other auxiliary instruments.
- Week Six: Test one: all instruments of the orchestra.
- Week Seven: Theory the staff, treble clef note names,
- Week Eight: bass clef note names
- Week Nine: Whole, half, quarter, notes and rests
- Week Ten: Eighth and sixteenth notes and rests
- Week Eleven: Dotted notes and rests
- Week Twelve: Time signatures, repeat signs, da capo, dal segno
- Week Thirteen: Finale Notepad intro to composition
- Week Fourteen: Composition Frere Jacque
- Week Fifteen: Happy Birthday 1&2
- Week Sixteen: Fill in the Blanks
- Weeks Seventeen & Eighteen: Final project: Original Composition

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
